Quartet Inducted Into Hall of Fame

USAMU Hall of Fame: Four additional members inducted at the USAMU 40th Reunion

Four new members were enshrined in the USAMU Hall of Fame on 17 August. Master Sergeant Loyd G. Crow, Jr., Colonel Jeremiah M. McKenzie, Lieutenant Colonel Tommy G. Pool, and Lieutenant Colonel Lones W. Wigger, Jr., joined the initial seven inductees as the elite of the elite.

Loyd Crow was the 1961 and 1963 World Champion in Running Deer. He won two silver medals in the 1969 World Moving Target Championships and won two silver medals and one bronze medal in the 1970 World Shooting Championships.

Jeremiah McKenzie was the USAMU Executive Officer 1964-1969 and the Deputy Commander and Chief, Support Division 1974-1986. From 1964 through 1986, he was the Director of the Small Arms Firing School at the National Matches. In 1983, he was the Project Manager for design and construction of the Pool Shooting Complex.

Tommy Pool won a gold medal and two bronze medals in the 1962 World Shooting Championships. In the 1964 Olympic Games, he won a bronze medal in the 50 meter English Match Prone.

Lones Wigger won a silver and a gold medal in the 1964 Olympics and a gold medal in the in the 1972 Olympics. He won a bronze medal and silver medal in the 1970 World Shooting Championships. He won a gold, two silver, and one bronze medal in both the

COMMANDER'S REPORT:

The 1996 Shooting Season is now History, the USAMU 40th Reunion a Success

The 1996 shooting season is now history. The final major competition is the CISM Championships that are being held in Skovde, Sweden. We have a strong team and will represent DOD well. CISM has changed since some of you represented the U.S. With the breakup of the Soviet Union, CISM now has over 108 countries which actively participate. It is still a very difficult competition with a lot of new faces joining annually.

Your USAMU has accomplished a tremendous amount during this year and space does not allow me to list all of these, but I'd like to just mention a few of the June - August accomplishments.

There were seven past members of the USAMU and two current (CPT Glenn Dubis and Laurence "Red" Mosely) chosen to carry the Olympic Torch on its journey to Atlanta. USAMU placed seven soldiers on the 1996 Olympic Team. We did not win a medal but you can be sure each soldier gave forth their best effort. SGT Terri Dewitt, (Ladies Double Trap), finished fourth in her event and CPT Rob Harbison made the final round in both air rifle and 50 meter 3X40. While the Olympics were going on, IR was also competing at Camp Perry. They won evcrything in sight--all prone and position team matches as well as each major individual aggregate. Not to be outdone, the Service Rifle Team, under Coach Frank Briggs, dominated the Service Rifle Interservice Competition. By winning the 10 man team match and Infantry Trophy as well as SGT Grant Singley's individual aggregate win, the Service Rifle Team notched up big wins for the Army. The only thing they could do to top that performance was to travel to Camp Perry and win the Service Rifle Individual Championships (SGT Singley) and break their week old National Record in Infantry Trophy by shooting a 1462. Just as the USAMU Gunsmith Shop has redesigned the M16A2, it has been working to make the 9MM Beretta into a quality center fire pistol. At the 1996 Service Pistol Interservice Championships, SPC Dianna Dzek placed second in the Leg match, using a USAMU improved 9MM. I will report to you further on our progress of this pistol shortly. The United States Army Marksmanship Unit headquarters was dedicated as Sharpe Hall at a ceremony on August 18th. The building was named in honor of Colonel Thomas J. Sharpe II, former Commander of the unit.

Colonel Sharpe, assigned to the marksmanship unit in 1956, was instrumental in getting the unit started. It was from his vision,



genius, charismatic leadership, and determination that the unit was born. In the 1964 Olympics, as the team captain, he led the marksmanship unit to two gold, two silver, and three bronze medals.

BG John G. Meyer, Jr., Commander of United States Army Community and Family Support Center (USAMU higher headquarters), was the guest speaker for the ceremony. Colonel Sharpe's widow, Naomi Sharpe, was a special guest and aided in unveiling a portrait of Colonel Sharpe and cutting the ribbon to officially dedicate the building and open it up for viewing by the attending crowd. During the ceremony the sign dedicating the headquarters was unveiled and a bronze plaque designating the building as Sharpe Hall was uncovered.


Willis Powell assembled an auspicious cooking crew to prepare the afternoon's vittles. Fish frying expertise was demonstrated setting moment.





The U.S. Army Marksmanship Unit Hall of Fame is located in Sharpe Hall (Building 243) at Fort Benning, Georgia. Located inside the main entrance to the USAMU headquarters, the hall enshines eleven of the best shooting competition people in the world. Seven members were inducted into the hall in April of 1994. Four more members were added to the rolls of the clite of the elite in an August 1996 ceremony.

Initial inductees include 1LT Gary Anderson, SGM William B. Blankenship, Jr., SGM Huelet L. Benner, CW4 Coats Brown, SFC Barbara J. Hile, MSG James L. McQuien, and MAJ Margaret T. Murdock. The four new members are MSG Loyd G. Crow, Jr., COL Jeremiah M. McKenzie, LTC Tommy G. Pool, and LTC Lones W. Wigger, Jr.

Each shooting section has a hall of fame display at their respective ranges. Also, a support section hall of fame is displayed in the unit headquarters.
