The 1997 AMUA annual meeting convened at the Pool **International Shooting Complex** on 11 January. Over 50 members and guests were greeted by President Bill Blankenship. The outgoing leader praised the efforts of membership and said special thanks to all elected officers, committee chairmen, and the USAMU Deputy. He said he had received many favorable letters and calls about the 40th reunion and gave thanks to all those involved with it. He also had high praises for LTC Richard Lake for his efforts in establishing the USAMU Library.

DEPUTY COMMANDER REPORTS ON 1996

Colonel Alan D. Fenty relinquished command on 8 January 1997 and will retire 31 March 1997. Colonel Fenty will be missed by the entire USAMU for his tireless leadership and concern over the missions of the USAMU. COL Fenty will retire in Columbus and is working at Total Systems, UpTown Columbus. The incoming commander should arrive sometime this summer; however, until then I have been named as the Acting Commander.

The unit is off to a fast start this year Brigadier General Evan R. Gaddis, Commander, Community Family Support Center, visited the unit and was shown what superb soldiers the unit has. He will carry these impressions back to Washington where he will fight for personnel policies and the budget for the USAMU. His visit was followed closely by one from MG Carl Ernst, Commanding General of Fort Benning. MG Ernst has maintained close ties to the USAMU throughout his career, since several of his previous assignments have been at Fort Benning. The unit tried to think of a way this General could be shown how the work performed by USAMU competition shooters and the shop translated to the needs of all other soldiers he commands at the Home of the Infantry. With that in mind, MG Ernst was given a tour of the shop and shown the improvements Mr. W.O. Harden and the entire Custom Firearms Shop Section have made to the M9 and the M16. MG Ernst was then escorted to the pits of Easley Range and stood under 6 silhouettes while 6 USAMU service rifle shooters proceeded to place all 240 rounds into these silhouettes, within 50 seconds, from five hundred yards. It was a superb demonstration by the Service Rifle Team.

I was also privileged to attend LTC (Ret) Lones W. Wigger's induction to the Chattahoochee Valley Hall of Fame, February 8th. It was good to see the community recognize such a great champion.

On the horizon are many challenges. Even though Major Steven Goff fired an 1196 in the three position any sight sectional; SSG Lance Hopper shot an 800 in the 4 position sectional; SSG Bret Erickson won the first 4 trap matches he has competed in this year; the Service Pistol team established 5 national records in January. etc., the

unit still needs your help identifying young talent, shooters, gunsmiths, and reloaders to help to maintain its proud legacy into the 21st century.

Membership Report



USAMU Commander Retires After 26 Years

The commander of the United States Army Marksmanship Unit retired after 26 years of service January 8 during an indoor ceremony at the Pool International Shooting Complex.

Surrounded by dozens of family, friends, and well wishers from the Fort Benning and Columbus communities, Col Alan D. Fenty, commander of the USAMU since August 1995. was honored at the ceremony.

Brig. Gen. Evan R. Gaddis, commander of the Community and Family Support Center, USAMU's higher headquarters, presented Fenty with the Legion of Merit.

The award certificate, signed by Secretary of the Army Togo D. West Jr., cited Col Fenty's outstanding duty performance, exceptional leadership and dedication to excellence, which were directly responsible for significantly enhancing total Army readiness and elevating Army competitive shooting to previously unachievable levels.

Gaddis also presented to Fenty's wife, Linda, a Department of the Army Certificate of Appreciation signed by Army Chief of Staff, Gen Dennis J. Reimer.

The members of the Army Marksmanship Unit recognized their commander's service to the unit by awarding him with the Blackhat - the USAMU symbol of a champion. Marksmanship Unit shooters and 1996 Olympians Sgts. Terri E. DeWitt and Kenneth A. Johnson read the Blackhat Certificate signed by Gaddis, and Laurence K. Mosely, the senior Olympian currently assigned to the unit, presented the certificate and hat to Col Fenty.

USAMU Olympian Claims USA Shooting 1996 Male Rifle Shooter of Year

A USAMU Olympian has been named the 1996 USA Shooting Male Rifle Shooter of the Year. Robert E. Harbison, an international rifle shooter, claimed the honor for the second year in a row

Harbison was a member of the 1996 U.S. Olympic Shooting Team and competed in both the men's free rifle event, in which he finished sixth, and air rifle event, where he placed seventh.

Harbison joined the Army in 1988 as an armor officer and was assigned to the 2nd Armored and the 1st Cavalry Division at Fort Hood, Texas, where he served as platoon leader and executive officer. He was assigned to the Army Marksmanship Unit in 1992 as a service rifle shooter and then became an international rifle shooter in 1993.

In addition to his Olympic accomplishments, in 1996 he won a Gold Medal in free rifle 3x40 at the Munich World Cup and was inducted into the USAMU International Rifle Hall of Fame.

In 1995, Harbison won Gold Medals in 300-Meter 3x20 and 50-Meter Free Rifle Prone at the Pan American Games and in 50-Meter Free Rifle 3x40 at the Seoul World Cup. He also won Silver Medals in men's 3x20 and men's 3x40 at the 300-Meter National Championships as well as being named the Men's Air Rifle Champion at the Air Rifle Sectionals.

He was the 1997 Interservice International Champion in 300-Meter Standard Rifle, the Georgia Regional Service Rifle Champion, and the Reynolds Trophy Winner.

Replacement Won't Be Here Until The Summer

The retirement of Col Alan Fenty has left a temporary gap in the command of the USAMU.

Col Fenty's departure precluded the arrival of his prospective successor Col Archibald Arnold by about six months

But that doesn't mean the Fort Benning based unit will be without a leader.

The unit's deputy commander, Robert Aylward, is grabbing hold of the reins.

"It's a great job to command," said Aylward, who retired from active duty in 1993. "You've got people who are so straight. They volunteer to come here. Every one truly believes in hard work. With what Col Fenty has established, I'll just fill the spot for a while."

Aylward, whose history with the unit dates back to 1974, said it's not unique for the deputy commander to fill in during lapses between commanders. In fact, Aylward performed similar stopgap duties before Col Fenty assumed command in August 1995. Aylward said he expects the new commander, who currently serves as the Deputy Chief of Staff for the United States Army Pacific Command in Hawaii, to arrive at Fort Benning early this summer.

"He's anxious to get here," Fenty said. "But the Deputy will do a fine job holding the fort down until he does get here."

According to Fenty, Arnold is known only as a tentative or prospective commander because he has not yet been given orders to assume command of the unit that was established in March of 1956 by President Dwight S. Eisenhower to train expert marksmen.

"But the general expects him to come, I expect him to come and he expects to come," Fenty said.
