The National Guard has seen that it is to their benefit to again take back this mission so, in 2003 the competition will revert back to Camp Robinson. I am impressed every day as to the ability, professionalism and stamina of our service rifle team. ## **USAR SHOOTER PROFILES:**

### Ray P. Carter

Ray P. Carter was born on Christmas Day 1950 at Fort Belvoir, VA. He started shooting with the Fort Belvoir Junior Rifle Club the night his father left for Viet Nam and became a stalwart of the famous Acoms Junior Rifle Team. Ray attended Tennessee Tech University on a rifle scholarship where he was a four year Collegiate All American and National Collegiate Service Rifle Champion in 1972. He was inducted into the school's Sports Hall of Fame in 1985. Commissioned a Regular Army Officer in 1973, he graduated from the Airborne School and Field Artillery Course and was assigned to the 197th Infantry Brigade at Fort Benning. He was a member of the 1974 National Trophy Championship Team and was assigned to the AMU International Team in 1975. His first individual medals came at the CISM Championships in Finland in 1975 in the 300 meter events. Leaving active duty and shooting for the USAR, Ray won gold team medals in the Championships of the Americas in Mexico City in 1977 in 50 Meter Prone and Air Rifle. He made the World Championship Team in 1978 to Korea where he won three gold and one silver team medals in 300 meter events, in 1979, at the same location, his silver team medal came in the Air Rifle event at the World Air Gun Championships. In 1981, he was again a member of the USA team to the World Air Gun Championships in the Dominican Republic.

Ray's largest medal haul came at the Championship of the Americas in Brazil in 1981 where he won four gold and one silver medal in events as diversified as 10 meter Air Rifle, 50 meter smallbore and 300 meter Standard Rifle. In 1982 he again displayed his diversified strength by bringing home four medals in the 50 meter and 300 meter events from the World Shooting Championships in Venezuela. His contribution to the USA continued at the 1985 Championship of the Americas held at Fort Benning (gold 300 meter team) and the 1986 World Championships in Sweden.

Major Carter's strength with the Service Rifle was a contributing factor again to the U S Army victories of National Trophy Teams in 1974 and 1976 and the USAR victory in 1978. He was a member of three Ten Man Team victories at the interservice match at Quantico. VA. As a phenomenal display of his skills with the M-14 Service Rifle, cal. 7.62, he fired in 4 National Trophy Team Matches at Camp Perry and 4 interservice Ten Man Team matches at the Quantico Marine Base, and never lost a point in the standing position! And that's on the decimal target, not the 5-V target, you old geozers who may be remembering the 5-V target of your days on the range. Ray is International Distinguished. Distinguished Rifle and holder of the President's Hundred Tab along with the NRA Smallbore Distinguished Prone and Position.

Ray Carter's talents were further displayed in his 1977 wins of the British smallbore prone and position championships while a member of the Lord Earl Roberts team from the USA competing at Bisley Camp.

#### David J. Cramer

David J. Cramer was born in 1943 in Indiana, PA, David began shooting in the NRA junior program in high school. He attended Indiana University of Pennsylvania becoming the first Collegiate All American in the school's history. He received a degree in Education with a major in Biology. For many years he shot in the Greater Pittsburgh Gallery Rifle League. This was historically one of the strongest indoor rifle leagues in the USA. Shooters like Barry Trew, Victor Polansky, Bruce Meredith, Jack Writer, Dean Bahrman, Ed Etzel, and Elliott Hutchinson, prior to their entry into the Army, would travel to sign up with one of the teams such as Waynesburg or Frazier-Simplex for the weekly match. It was a great recruiting area for the AMU. Dave Cramer became National Indoor Champion in 1967 as a civilian/ROTC Cadet shooting for the Frazier-Simplex Team. He eventually won the same title ten years later for the USAR.

LTC Cramer was commissioned in the Quartermaster Corps in 1967 and assigned to Fort Lee, VA. He served with the Americal Division in Chu Lai. VietNam, 1967-68. Upon return from Viet Nam, he was assigned to the Fort Benning and helped organize the Post Marksmanship Detachment that dominated the 1969 Third Army Championships. He was subsequently assigned to the AMU International Rifle Team later in 1969.

David Cramer left active duty in 1970 and was recruited to shoot with the USAR International Rifle and Service Rifle Teams. He did an excellent job as coach of the International Rifle Team and subsequently went on to be the OIC of that team and then the OIC of all USAR Rifle Teams 1992-94. He retired in 1994 with 26 years of combined active and reserve service.

Dave became International Distinguished when he shot on the USA World Championship Team to Switzerland in 1974, winning the bronze individual and the silver team medal in the men's air rifle event as well as the silver team medal in the 50-meter Standard Rifle event. In the 1975 Pan American Games in Mexico City, he was a member of the gold medal team in the Air Rifle event and then the silver team medal in that event in the 1979 World Air Gun Championships in Seoul, Korea, He was also a member of the USA Pan Am Team to Puerto Rico in 1979.

Dave was a member of the Army Reserve Team that won the National Championship at Camp Perry in the 1.000 yard any sight team match in 1983. Thus, he proved his talent with any rifle from air rifle to magnum. He is a Distinguished Rifleman and holder of the President's Hundred Tab. He won the National Trophy Individual rifle match at Camp Perry in 1972. He competed in three National Sports Festivals and holds 78 National Record Certificates. He is also is Distinguished in NRA Smallbore Rifle Prone and Position, and won the Distinguished Armbrust Badge by shooting with the USA bronze medal team in the World Modern Crossbow Championships in Switzerland in 1981.

He also won the Canadian Smallbore Rifle Championships 1980. His Distinguished Crossbow status in 1981 at the IAU World Championships in Switzerland rounded out a wonderful competitive history.

Major Carter, upon leaving active duty in 1977, became the Rifle Coach at East Tennessee State University. He, as many other AMU trained competitors, contributed to the sport by serving in positions of leadership. He filled the NCAA Rifle Chair 1979-80 and Secretary - Rules Editor until 1983. He received his Master of Business Administration in 1983 and went to work for USA Shooting in Washington, D.C.,

and later in Colorado Springs: He was on the USOC Board of Directors in 1994 and later as Deputy Director of the Civilian Marksmanship Program. the USAMU Headquarters front lobby. Did you know the U.S. Army Flag was first unfurled in Washington, DC, on 12 June 1956?

You will soon receive a ballot to vote for the next group of USAMU Hall of Fame inductees. Please remember this is a not an MMA ballot. Also, understand the ballot only list candidates that are already in the section Halls of Fame.

Back in my era, the emphasis was placed on team shooting — win the National Trophy Team Match and Beat the Marine Team at Camp Perry. The criterion today has shifted to recognizing individual performance. I am still doing what can be done to have several of the earlier USAMU shooters and support personnel recognized in the USAMU shooting Halls of Fame. Nominating our best individual shooters for induction into the Halls of Fames is based on objective criteria. We have an acceptable set of rules for that in the USAMU SOP. However, nominating individuals for their value as a team performer or for their contribution to marksmanship is subjective and therefore not easily defined. I am working to remedy this oversight.

As noted, an individual must be in a section Hall of Fame to be eligible for the USAMU Hall of Fame. There has been very little activity in adding more individuals into the section Halls of Fame. I believe it is beneficial for the section coaches to perpetuate the accomplishments of past shooters assigned to their section so they can challenge their new shooters to surpass the accomplishments of those honored in the sections Hall of Fame. I challenge all section coaches to identify a list of candidates for induction into their section Hall of Fame. The MMA Historian can provide you with institutional memory and photographs.

Finally, take some time to communicate with each other especially our senior members and those who are now without a spouse. Sometimes, a word or two, over the phone or through the mail, will brighten a dark day. Take care!

SFC Norris Domingue, 72, died March 15, 2002, in Phenix City, Alabama. SFC Domingue was a pistol shooter with the Third Army MTU and the USAMU National Trophy Group. He was awarded the Distinguished Pistol Shot Badge in 1965.

1SG James B. Manning, 84, died April 21, 2002, in Columbus, Georgia. 1SG Manning was a Service Rifle shooter and was a member of several record setting Infantry Trophy teams. He was awarded the Distinguished Rifleman Badge in 1959.

SFC Vincent Angus, 66, died May 23, 2002, in Columbus, Georgia. SFC Angus was a pistol gunsmith with the Third Army MTU and the USAMU National Trophy Group.

CWO Pasquales "Pat" E. Melaragno died on May 24, 2002, in Rhode Island. Pat was a long time member of the "All" USAR Pistol Squad. He was awarded the Distinguished Pistol Shot Badge in 1962.

#### HALL OF FAME NOMINEES CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

HERSCHEL ANDERSON: Service Pistol Shooter won the National Pistol Championships in 1973 and 1974. Interservice Pistol Champion in '973, 74 and 75. Won 10 Pan American Games medals. Currently holds the three gun 2700agg record at 2680-159X.

RAYMOND BEHNAY: Master Gunsmith customized the rifles used by countless worldclass shooters to win most of the international rifle medals won by USAMU shooters in the 1960's and 1970's.

**ERICH BULJUNG**: International Pistoi Shooter won 31 Gold medals, 16 silver medals and 7 bronze medals in international competition; Was 1988 Olympic Silver medallist; Set two individual world records.

DANIEL CARLISLE; Shotgun Shooter won the 1975 Pan American Games Trap Gold medal; 1982 World Skeet Champion; 1983 Pan Am Gold medal (trap); 1984 Olympic Bronze Medal (trap), 1987 Pan American Games trap Gold medal.

MATT DRYKE: Shotgun Shooter was the 1981 World Record Skeet; 1983 Pan American Games and World Moving Target Champion; 1984 Olympic Gold Medal; 1986 World Skeet Champion.

✓ JACK FOSTER: Running Target and International Rifle Shooter won 15 gold, 14 Silver and 1 Bronze Medal in international competition. Set 2 individual and 3 team world records.

MARTIN GUNNARSSON: International Rifle Shooter was a 1964 Olympic Games Bronze Medalist. Earned 2 gold and 2 bronze in international competition. Was a member of one world record setting team.

**DONALD HALDEMAN**: Shotgun shooter was the 1975 International Clay Pigeon Champion; 1975 Silver medallist at Pan American Games; Olympic Gold medal in 1976.

**BONNIE HARMON**: Service Pistol Shooter was four time Camp Perry Pistol Champion; Five time Interservice Pistol Champion; Two-time CISM Pistol Champion and winner of a Silver and Bronze at the 1974 World Championships.

FRED KEIFER: 1963 OIC of Pistol Section; 1964 AMU XO; 1965 Chief of Competitive Division; 1966-1990 AMU International Coordinator; Team Manager of 1964 Olympic Team, 1967 Pan American Team; 1982 World Shooting Team 1983 World Air Gun Shooting Team

JAMES LAGUANA: Service Pistol Shooter won the 1984 National Pistol Championships. Member of three victorious CISM teams and winner of the 1987 All Army Pistol Championships.

TROY LAWTON: Running Target Shooter, Dominated RT in the late 80's and early 90's winning 4 national championships and a bronze medal in the 1991 Pan American Games.

WILLIAM LEE: Service Rifle Shooter won three All-Army championships, two interservice championships; member of three record-setting National Trophy Teams, and member of the 1976 PALMA team.

JIMMIE MCCOY: International Pistol Shooter was a three time Indoor national champion in free and standard pistol; Member of 1982 Silver medal Free Pistol Team at the World Championships. And 1991 National Standard Pistol Champion.

JAMES MCNALLY: International Pistol shooter and member of 1968 and 1972 Olympic Team; 1962 Bronze Medallist at World Championships and two time National RF Pistol Champion.

**DANIEL PUCKEL:** International Rifle Shooter won 4 gold, 5 silver and 4 bronze medals in international competitions. Set 2 individual world records and one team world record.

✓ WILLIAM PULLUM: Coached and managed literally thousands of competitors who have won over 250 gold medals in national and international rifle competition.

**GREG STROM**: Only Service Rifle Shooter to win all three major matches (U.S. Army, Interservice and National Championships) in the same year. Won the Presidents match twice, two interservice titles, and member of two winning ten-man teams.

✓ MICHAEL THEIMER: Running Target shooter won 6 national championships during his 7-year career. Won ten international medals and has the U.S. highest Running Target finish (8<sup>th</sup>) in history fired during the 1976 Olympic Games.

**EARL WATERMAN**: Service Rifle Shooter and winner of two Interservice Individual Championships and the 1975 National Service Rifle Championships. On 4 national record teams, two national and 5 interservice Infantry trophy teams, and 6 winning ten man teams.

OSCAR WEINMEISTER: Member of several national records setting pistol teams. Was head coach of USAMU Service Pistol Team from 1958-1966.

ROBERT WHITACRE: Service Pistol Shooter was a three time National indoor pistol champion; member of gold and bronze medal team at 1971 Pan American Games; Member of 2670 Club.

**ROGER WILLIS**: Service Pistol Shooter was the 1983 National Pistol Champion; Firing member of the 1981 "Clean Sweep", Shot a high score of 2675X157.

THOMAS WOODS: Service Pistol Shooter was a two time National indoor pistol champion; Won the 1986 National Pistol Championships; Member of eight CISM Pistol Teams; Winner of 1977, 1986 President's Hundred Match.

**VERLE WRIGHT:** International Rifle Shooter won 8 gold, 7 silver and 4 bronze medals in international competition. Set 1 individual and 2 team world records.


