The last 3 months as the Commander of the AMU have been very busy and I would like to start this letter off by saying thank you to those of you that have taken the time to share your thoughts and experiences with me. Hopefully you find our newsletter informative. One of the first things I did when I arrived was try to assess how we contributed directly to the warfighter. Winning competitions and Olympic medals clearly helps with the recruiting effort. I was surprised to learn though that we trained over 4000 soldiers Army wide last year. The majority of these soldiers were heading to either Iraq or Afghanistan and many of them were from either the National Guard or the Army Reserves. The focus of much of this training was to train the trainer. So not only did these soldiers receive marksmanship instruction by the best shooters in the Department of Defense but they took that training back to their units and trained other soldiers.

Over the last few months we have been fully engrossed in the competition season which has allowed us to make contact with thousands of military and civilian competitors as well as foreign competitors. Hundreds of junior shooters have been sponsored or mentored during junior events over the last several months which has allowed us to tell the Army message to these younger Americans.

Soldiers from the AMU have taught over 1000 civilians, young and old, during the Small Arms Firing Schools in both Pistol and Rifle at Camp Perry this year. After our soldiers spend long days on the ranges teaching civilians they roll into long days competing in the National Competitions. The Civilian Marksmanship Program and the National Rifle Association both have done a great job in organizing these events and having the ranges in excellent condition.

The Custom Firearms Shop added a few new faces and welcomed one back. SGT Daniel Kubicki and Mrs. Jackerland Richardson were new additions to the shop and we look forward their contributions to the team. Mr. Jay Wilson returned from a tour in Iraq with his Reserve Unit and he is already back in the groove. Hardy congratulations to Mr. Will Carpenter who earned the Accessions Support Brigade Civilian of the Quarter.

ner of the Reynolds trophy was SFC Ward. The Service Pistol Team has now won the Interservice championships two years in a row. 

International Pistol and International Rifle are getting into the home stretch for the Olympics and have done well this past quarter. Along with all the other events they have won, SFC Thomas A. Tamas received the Gold Medal in the Free Rifle Prone competition, in which Spc. Michael D. McPhail got the Silver SFC Daryl L. Szarenski took the Silver Medal in the Free Pistol competition and SFC Thomas A. Rose got the Bronze in Air Pistol.

The Action Shooting team continues to set records and dominate the fastest growing shooting sport in America. Staff Sgt. Maxient J. Michel Jr. defeated over 390 of the country's best practical shooters to win the Open National Championship.

I would like to finish this letter by saying goodbye to SGM Ybarra and welcoming his replacement SGM Fuller. After 25 years of service in a wide range of assignments SGM Ybarra is going to retire. Coats Brown, A Legacy Ken Hamill

This series is about the life and times of a shooting legend who became the first Service Rifle Head Coach of USAMU in 1956. If you shot or worked with Coats Brown, please send any memories you have of those times to the Editor so the membership can share or relive them.

Fort McClellan, Alabama. In July of 1937, Coats was sent to become a member of the Infantry Rifle Team. The high rifle shooter in each battalion was sent to the Infantry Team those days. Qualification scores were also considered. In some cases, more than one member of a battalion made the Infantry Team. There were 60 - 70 shooters on the Infantry Team. Of this number, approximately 12 men were pistol shooters, the remainder shot or coached rifle. Making the team was based strictly on score, no politics. He traveled by train alone from Anniston to Toledo, then to LaCarne, Ohio, arriving about noon. He walked to Erie Ordnance Depot about 3 miles away and asked the front gate guard the location of the Infantry Rifle Team. He reported to the OIC, Major Easley. Major Easley welcomed Coats and had the team adjutant assign him to a tent. After a clerk pointed him in the right direction, Coats dropped off his gear and went to the Army Team Mess for lunch. He then drew bedding, mosquito bar, etc. and made his tent area neat. Team members were issued star gauged 1903 Springfield rifles and other necessary shooting accessories. They used M49 spotting scopes then as they do today, but they used the total Army system, as issued including the tripod. Shooting jackets were required and hand sewn. First time team members were issued a sheepskin and a World War I blouse. The high collar was removed from the blouse. Supply personnel had drawn the outline of elbow and shoulder pads on the sheepskins. The pads were cut out and sewed to the blouse shoulder and elbows so the fleece side did not show. Coats mother had taught him to sew and he earned extra money sewing for others.

The Infantry Team met as a group a couple days after Coats Brown had arrived at Erie Ordnance Depot. Major Easley introduced his officers and staff and each individual member of the team without notes. He knew every mans name. He would ask the members of the 1st Infantry Regiment to stand as he called their names. He then proceeded to

the 2nd Infantry Regiment and so forth until everyone had been introduced. The scope of training and ground rules were laid out for the team. Major Easley had written a shooters guide to educate the shooters. He had "The Plan of Campaign" typed, reproduced and distributed to each team member as part of their issued gear. This pamphlet explained sighting and aiming; positions; trigger control; effects of weather; care and cleaning of equipment and everything else that he could think of that might make his men winners. Major Easley also taught marksmanship classes to the team. Coats remembers Major Easley warning the team about dampness warping the rifle stock and changing a rifles zero. Major Easley had also taught how temperature effects the strike of the bullet at long ranges.

A hard top road ran through the Infantry Team area and led to the ranges on Camp Perry. Two rows of a dozen or so tents were butted perpendicular to the road as accommodations for the team shooters. Tents were placed 4 feet apart. The distance between the two rows of tents was approximately 15 feet and formed the company street, about 75 yards long. The messhall was a brick structure located on one flank of the tent area. A wood structure served as team headquarters and was located directly across the hard top road from the tents. A wood latrine with showers and a place to wash clothing was located 25 yards past the back end of the company street. The area beyond the latrine was the service detachment personnel complex. The tents had wood floors and a wood frame. A wood frame screen door served as the entranceway. Each shooter had a 30" wide steel bed with a mattress 6" inches thick. There were five beds per tent. There was a table and chairs in the center area. A single light bulb hung by its electrical cord from the top center of the tent. Some shooters stored their rifle overnight by leaning them against the sidewall. Others suspended their rifles horizontally under the bed frame using two loops of cord. Coats slept with his rifle. He placed the piece under the bed covers next to him on the mattress. He knew that dampness and the wood rifle stock meant possible warping, zero changes and lost points on the range. A Bachelor Officers Quarters was located 500 yards distance from the tent area near the Erie Ordnance Depot Main Gate. The BOO housed the nine or ten team officers.

TAPS, PRESENT ARMS

LTC (Retired) Clyde Carter Chadwick, 79, died on Thursday, August 9, 2007, in Colorado Springs, Colorado. LTC Chadwick was drafted in 1946 and served in the U.S. Army for over 22 years in WWII, Korea, and Vietnam. Clyde graduated from OCS at Fort Riley, Kansas, in 1949, and was commissioned a Second Lieutenant of Infantry. He was stationed in Japan when the Korean War began and was assigned to Task Force Smith in Korea where he was a platoon leader. He was wounded and awarded the Silver Star Medal, the Purple Heart, and the Combat Infantryman Badge. LTC Chadwick served in a variety of assignments including a tour in Iran where he was personally decorated by the late Shah, and in Vietnam where he tested the AR-15 rifle which would be adopted by the Army as the M-16 Service Rifle. His last assignment was the Commanding Officer of the 6th U.S. Army Advanced Marksmanship Training Unit at Fort Ord, California.

SFC (Retired) George H. Floyd, 72, died in Phenix City, Alabama, on August 11, 2007.

SFC Floyd was a USAMU Service Rifle Shooter. He was awarded the U.S. Army Distinguished Rifleman Badge in 1969.


SFC (Retired) Marvin H. Wing, 79, died in Columbus, Georgia, on August 20, 2007.


