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USAMU Gets a New Commander

The Home of Champions welcomed a new commander, Lt. Col. Christopher Thielenhaus, and bid farewell to Lt. Col. Casey Mills t during a Change of Command Ceremony at Fort Moore, Georgia.

Mills said of the AMU, "I am honored to stand in this company." Overall, the contributions the AMU makes to the Army are impressive.

"We've got multiple national and world champions. We've got President's 100 Champions from both pistol and rifle. We've got National Trophy Individual Champions from rifle and pistol. There's a two-time national 3-Gun Champion in here, who I don't even think is old enough to drink alcohol yet, or maybe just turned this year. What a career he is going to have in front of him."

Mills went on to thank the AMU civilians who selfless serve the Soldiers behind the scenes so they can be successful.

As the incoming commander, Thielenhaus came up to address the crowd, but first, he spoke to Mills.

"I can say with absolute confidence that you have left this unit in probably the best state that it's been in many, many years. And that has been echoed to me by many people who have worked in this unit before...I don't think you could have done a better job."

To the Soldiers, Thielenhaus confessed that he had to be up front.

"I picked this unit as my number one choice for three reasons. And that's because you guys represent the three things that I am most passionate about in the Army. That's the importance of winning, Soldier lethality, and telling the Army story. And that's the things you guys do on a day to day basis. One of those three things happens here every single day, and that's why I am so excited to take this unit."

Well, what has transpired over these past few months has been truly amazing! The NIM received a total of \$66,500 in AMU-designated donations, enough to guarantee <u>all</u> the project costs are fully funded!!!

In all, NIM received 43 donations from generous MMA members and friends. Thank you so much to those who were able to donate and fund the creation of a permanent AMU exhibit. What a legacy for the AMU! Four (4) \$10,000 donations were particularly noteworthy. Special thanks to Dave Erickson for donating \$10K to match the first \$10K donated by MMA members, to Don Harmon for donating \$10K, and to Ellen and David Ross III for

USAMU Welcomes New Command Sergeant Major

Soldiers and civilians of the U.S. Army Marksmanship Unit welcomed Command Sgt. Maj. Michael Ramon M. Dang as their battalion command sergeant major today during an Assumption of Responsibility Ceremony.

Lt. Col. Christopher Thielenhaus, commander of the USAMU, said he normally preferred to speak off the cuff at ceremonies, but he had prepared a few points because this event deserved it.

"We are absolutely thrilled to have you,"

Thielenhaus said to Dang. "In the short time you have been here, you have already made it clear that you're excited to be at the Army Marksmanship Unit and you are eager to get to know the Soldiers."

Dang, who has deployed numerous times, comes to the USAMU after last serving as the brigade operations sergeant major for Joint Multinational Training Center in Hohenfels, Germany.

Thielenhaus said Dang's perspective as an experienced senior noncommissioned officer will be invaluable here at the Home of Champions.

"I've seen you demonstrate knowledge of your craft already, and I can tell that you will continue to impress," he explained.

Dang stepped up to the podium to address the crowd as the new battalion command sergeant major.

"It is both an honor and profound privilege to stand before you, and I am truly humbled by the trust placed in me," he said.

Aware of the USAMU legacy, Dang told the Soldiers that he was committed to upholding the high standards that define the Home of Champions through winning competitions, enhancing the Army's readiness, and telling the Army story.

Looking out over the crowd, Dang took a moment to thank his family and friends in attendance, as well as those watching online. Dang noted the importance of their support, from military peers to a high school friend he had not seen in 27 years. To his brother, retired Command. Sgt. Maj. Ramon M. Dang (senior), Dang acknowledged the years of mentorship his brother had provided throughout his career.

"I remember always trying to catch up to you. Well, I caught up," he said as the audience laughed. With that, Dang said he was ready to embrace this new journey with humility and enthusiasm and looks forward to helping the Soldiers ensure the unit remains the Home of Champions.

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Retired U.S. Army Colonel Sue Ann Sandusky, Ph.D., passed away peacefully on October 29 at the Willow Ridge nursing home in Bluffton, OH.

Sue was born January 20, 1952, in Houston, Texas, to Samuel C. and Dorothy D. Sandusky, both of whom predeceased her. She is survived by her brother Tim (Sher) Sandusky of Silver Spring, Maryland, her aunt Marilyn June (Deer) Kindsfater of Greeley, Colorado, and numerous cousins. She is mourned by her colleagues from her trailblazing 37-year Army career, the competitive rifle shooting community, academia, and her many friends and associates in Africa, especially Sidnomo "Christophe" Konkobo, who worked in her household for many years and became a dear family friend.

She began her academic career at Texas Christian University, graduating in 1974 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Journalism and Government. Sue was a Rotary International fellow at the University of London School of Slavonic and East European Studies and completed a Master of Arts degree in Soviet and East European Area Studies in

1977. She completed a Master of Philosophy degree in Political Science from Columbia University in 1982 and a Master of Strategic Studies degree from the U.S. Army War College in 2002. In 2020 she earned her Doctor of Philosophy degree in Higher Education Administration from Bowling Green State University.

Sue began competitive rifle shooting with the Findlay junior rifle team during high school. As a sophomore at TCU, she joined the university rifle team, and through hard work and devoted, disciplined practice, became one of the top competitive shooters in the country. She was a three-time All-American at TCU and was named TCU's top female athlete of the 1970's. She has been inducted into both the TCU Athletic Hall of Fame and the Hancock County (Ohio) Sports Hall of Fame.

Upon graduating from TCU, Sue enlisted in the U.S. Army Reserve and was a member of the U.S. Army Reserve International Shooting Team from 1975 to 1982. In 1977, she won three gold medals (two team and one individual) at the Championships of the Americas in Mexico City. In 1978, she repeated the feat with three golds (two team and one individual) at the World Shooting Championships in Seoul, Korea. Regrettably, Sue missed her chances to compete for Olympic gold, first in 1980, when the U.S. boycotted the Moscow Olympics, and then in 1984, when she missed qualifying for the U.S. Olympic Team after a tie-breaking shoot-off. She was especially proud of the Distinguished International Shooter Badge, the Distinguished Rifleman Badge and the President's Hundred Tab she earned during her Army career.

In 2003, she was detailed to civil war-torn Liberia, where she and her team, under the leadership of U.S. Ambassador John W. Blaney, confronted and negotiated with heavily armed rebel forces to ensure passage for humanitarian aid to the besieged capital of Monrovia. Ambassador Blaney has described her as "heroic" and "brilliant," and has written that this "frontline breakthrough" led to a peace that saved "uncounted lives," averting the disintegration of Liberia and preventing the area from potentially becoming an "incubator for terrorists" in West Africa. Ambassador Blaney ascribes much of the success of their mission to the actions of Colonel Sandusky.

Sue served as the Director of African Studies at the U.S. Army War College, Carlisle Barracks, Pennsylvania, from 2006 to 2007. In 2007, she became the first woman to be appointed Commandant of the Defense Language Institute Foreign Language Center, Monterey, California, an assignment that she considered her dream job. In 2010, she returned to the U.S. Embassy in Liberia as Senior Defense Official and Defense Attaché, serving until 2012.

During her career as an attaché, she received the National Exceptional Human Intelligence Collector Award from the Director of Central Intelligence (1998) and the Defense Intelligence Agency Director's Award (2004), as well as numerous citations from the U.S. Department of State. She was inducted into the Defense Attaché Hall of Fame in 2008.

Sue was known for her acute analytical skills and her prowess as a writer. In the conditions of armed conflict and political violence in which she served, she was known as a skilled negotiator. It was said that as the level of chaos around her grew, the calmer she became. As accomplished as she was, she avoided talking about her achievements. If asked, she was humble and self-deprecating, deflecting praise and credit away from herself and on to her team.

Throughout her shooting career and later in the military, she championed the right of women to equal treatment whether in athletic competition or military career fields.

Upon her retirement from the Army in 2013, Sue returned to Findlay to oversee the care of her aging parents. In the meantime, she enrolled at Bowling Green State University, where she earned a teaching certificate in French prior to completing her Ph.D. She taught as an adjunct professor at Tiffin University until her illness made that impossible.

An inveterate adventurer, at the conclusion of her assignment in Korea she took the Siberian Express from Beijing to Moscow where her brother was on diplomatic assignment at the U.S. Embassy for the Department of State. In Africa she climbed Mt. Kilimanjaro, canoed the Zambezi River, trekked to Timbuktu and saw the headwaters of the Nile. Sue took great joy in interacting with and generously supporting a variety of individuals and causes in the African nations where she served. She amassed an extensive collection of African art and loved the four distinctive African village dogs that she brought to Ohio.

Sue was a member of Trinity Episcopal Church in Findlay where she served on the vestry and as Senior Warden. A funeral service took place on November 7 at 11:00 a.m. at Trinity Episcopal Church, 128 W Hardin St., Findlay, OH 45840. Arrangements for interment at Arlington National Cemetery are pending.

LTC Phillip F. Cannella, Jr., USA Ret



The MMA announces the sad loss of LTC Phillip F. Cannella, Jr., USA Ret. He passed away on December 16, 2024.

He served in Korea and then in Vietnam with MACV in 1967 -1968 (Tet), where he became a decorated veteran highlighted by a Bronze Star with 2V, Air Medal 4 OLC, MSM 5 OLC, VN Service Ribbon, VN Cross of Gallantry (4) and the Combat Infantryman Badge, Master Parachute Badge and Aviator Badge. He did a tour at USAMU from 1974 to 1981. Previous assignments included the Ranger Dept at Fort Benning, Psychological Operations at Fort Bragg and Okinawa, then again to Korea and Fort Eustis, VA before retiring.

A member of many teams at AMU that set new records. His Infantry Trophy and Interservice 10-Man Rifle Teams at Quantico were champions that worked hard to pull together and win. His teams at Camp Perry were con stantly able to carry the winning flags of the Army at the National Matches. As

Chief of Competition, he inherited the responsibility of organizing the All Army Matches and the Small Arms Firing School at Camp Perry. He and his team also conducted training of soldiers, law enforcement and civilians in sniper and counter sniper duties. In 1979, at age 46, using an M-14 NM rifle, he shot a standing score of 200x11x at Quantico, VA. The record stood for 10 years. During his career, he made 9 CISM teams, twice becoming individual champion, where he excelled in 3-Position Rapid Fire. Being a well-rounded competitor, he also had fine results with an Air Rifle and the 1,000-yard Magnums. He continued supporting the AMU as a Past President of the Military Marksmanship Association.

LTC Cannella will be missed.

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Where are they now? - SSG David Kimes

David Kimes, MMA Life Member since 2005, was a two time All-American at the University of California, Berkley in 1961 and 1962. During the Vietnam War era, he was drafted as a Private into the U. S. Army in November 1963. He served at Fort Ord, CA and then the Fort Benning Army Marksmanship Unit, where he was a barracks mate of Jim McHugh (AMU McHugh Field) until 1966. He subsequently continued with the Army Reserve Rifle Teams until retirement as a Staff Sergeant in 1993. He has Distinguished Badges with the Service Rifle, International Rifle (#172) and NRA Smallbore Rifle Prone and Position. He qualified for the President's Hundred Tab at Camp Perry, Ohio. He was inducted into the USA Shooting Hall of Fame in Colorado Springs in 2017.

David Kimes has an amazing accomplishment of being a member of six straight World Championship Teams for the United States: 1966 Germany, 1970 USA, 1974 Switzerland, 1978 Korea, 1982 Venezuela and 1986 Sweden. He has 14 individual and team World Shooting Championship medals in Smallbore Rifle, Air Rifle and 300 Meter Rifle. He also has Gold Team Medals from the Championship of the Americas in Mexico in



1973 and 1977. He was on the 1979 Pan American Games Team. He took leave from his job at the North American Rockwell-Apollo/Shuttle Programs for three years to train daily and was successful in making the 1980 U. S. Olympic Team, only to suffer the disappointment of the USA boycotting those games in Russia. He has numerous National Records and National Championships, but his ca-

reer highlights were the Individual Gold Medals in 300 Meter Standard Rifle at the World Championships in 1974 and 1978, establishing a New World Record each time.



Twice World Champion, David Kimes, has given back to his sport. He served on the U. S. Olympic Committee Athlete's Advisory Council representing Shooting from 1980 to 1988. From 2011 to present, he has coached the U. S. Navy Safe Harbor wounded warrior Teams to the (wounded) Warrior Games. He

also served on the NRA International Competitions Committee. He is a solid source of help for the current

USA Teams and has been an Assistant Coach at regional clinics and at the World Shooting Championships in Germany in 2010. He is also Distinguished with the Modern Crossbow, having medaled in five World Crossbow Championships in Europe. He served as the Continental Vice President of the International Armbrust Union from 1981 to 1987.

David lives in California and coaches juniors at the Los Angeles Rifle and Revolver Club and regularly comes to AMU reunions.
